





THE NATIONAL EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICE-NEMS

On the 15th of October 2018, the National Emergency Medical Service (NEMS) started: a national network of ambulances coordinated to provide free-of-charge aid and emergency medical assistance in the prehospital setting, involving personnel trained in rescue, stabilization and transport of traumatic and medical emergencies.

The NEMS service, initially operational in Pujehun district, has progressively expanded throughout all 16 districts, becoming operative at national level on the 27th of May 2019. The project has been developed with the support of the Ministry of Health, in partnership with Regione Veneto and CRIMEDIM, and finacially supported by the World Bank.

among ambulance drivers, paramedics and OC operators have been trained since the beginning of the service. All staff receives continuous trainings: two rounds of refresher trainings, beyond the initial one, have already taken place.




MONITORING

- Definition and update of protocols and procedures
- Continuous check and maintenance of the ambulances: fuel control, daily checklist for cleaning and medical materials
- Weekly and monthly reports on the status of the vehicles and on the ambulances' activities
- Monitoring of the road conditions and the status of the referral hospitals


TYPOLOGY OF PATIENTS REFERRED



In January 2020, 50% of patients was reached in 34 minutes or less and referred to hospital in less than 1 hour and 40 minutes.


